NOTE: If you are under 25 years of age and considered a dependent for federal financial aid purposes, you must add your taxable income and your parents' together to determine eligibility. Please bring signed copies of your and your parents' federal tax returns. If federal financial aid considers you an independent student, as is possible under certain federal guidelines, you can qualify based on just your income.

For students meeting the disability criteria, you will need to self-identify with Disability Services at BMCC.

If you are not a U.S. citizen, we will need to make a copy of your permanent resident card.

CAMP:

The College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) is a federally funded program that supports students from migrant and seasonal farmworker backgrounds during their first year in college. The program provides supplemental financial assistance and support services, with the goal of preparing them to continue their education and obtain a degree.

Eligibility:

- Either the student or one of his/her parents must have worked as a migrant/seasonal farmworker at least 75 days in the past 24 months. This includes any activity directly related to the production of crops, dairy products, poultry or livestock; the cultivation or harvesting of trees including nursery and forestry work; or fish farm work or be eligible to participate or have participated in (a) the Migrant Education Program (MEP) or participated in the National Farmworker Jobs Program (NFJP) of Section 167 of the WIA.
- Have a high school diploma or GED certificate.
- Be in the first year of college undergraduate studies (freshman status, minimum WR080, RD080 through the Placement Test or the Alternate WR/RD test).
- Enroll in at least 12 credits hours per term (full-time status).
- Must be a U.S Citizen or U.S Permanent Resident.

 - Qualify for financial aid or meet financial need guidelines.
 - Have a documented disability and qualify for services through the Center for Accessible Resources.

*Students who have already earned a degree are not eligible to enroll in TRiO.

The TLC has only 200 slots each year. Enrollment is limited to about 100 students each year. Once you enroll in TRiO, you remain a TRiO student until you leave LaneCC.

DREAM Program:

The DREAM Project is funded by PCC's yearly DREAMers Gala. All funds collected go towards students who earn a scholarship. The DREAM Project is currently housed at Rock Creek.

The DREAM Project is a mentoring program that offers scholarships or tuition support to PCC Undocumented and DACAmented students. We focus on the empowerment and support of DREAMers because we recognize that Undocumented and DACAmented students face unique and distinct challenges that require additional support to embark on this educational journey successfully.

DREAM Project mentees are PCC students navigating the PCC system for the first time, or students that have not completed their first year. As a mentee, you will be assigned a mentor that is also Undocumented or DACAmented and has successfully learned and navigated the PCC system. Mentees are required to commit to at least 30 hours of training, mentoring contact, and meetings with the program coordinator over the course of winter and spring terms.

The goal of the DREAM Project is to provide Undocumented and DACAmented college students with an opportunity to develop leadership skills, explore career options, and gain knowledge on how to navigate the PCC system.
